Food Pantry Sets Distribution Dates


NWACC's Food Pantry provides help to students, faculty and staff throughout the year.

Clubs Place in Contest

NWACC Takes First Place, Honorable Mention in Competition

The days of regular schooling have been put on hiatus because of COVID's oozing into everyone's lives, making everything harder, including earning an education. COVID has changed the way people learn and teach. To combat this spreading virus, the Arkansas Department of Health, through its division of the Office of Health Equity and its Be Well Arkansas Program, sponsored a video contest for Arkansas colleges. Contestants were to create a YouTube video that compels students to follow COVID safety guidelines while on (and off) campus. Two clubs at NorthWest Arkansas Community College won awards for their videos. The GEEK Alliance won first place with a prize of \$5,000, and the Music Club won an honorable mention with a prize of \$1,000. Both videos, along with the second-place runner-up, created by the students at the UA for UNI-CEF, urged their peers to follow the COVID guidelines.

GEEK Alliance and Dustin Mapes won first place. Mapes also made a Spanish version, and a shorter, 30-second version.

Mapes said, "The idea for the video came from my frustration with the dividing lines of the debate around COVID." Mapes said he wanted his video to convey the idea of unity, urging others to do the right thing, not because they were told to but simply because it was the obvious thing to do. For this reason, Mapes said he deliberately strayed from telling people what to do and what not to do, but instead thanked those who were following the CO-VID guidelines. The pandemic hit

A 45-second video created by the Mapes, like many, hard, he said. His son was born last July with a respiratory condition.

"Every day," he said, "I went to work dreading the possibility of catching this virus and passing it to my son." Mapes created his video with the help of the Springdale School District. He said he felt like he made something worthwhile.

Michele R. Smith, director of the Office of Health Equity, said of the video on the Arkansas Department of Health's website, "The winning entry clearly showed the effects COVID-19 can have on campus, all while calling on fellow students to

Certificates Another Way to Earn

Communication & Arts Offers 63 Programs to Students

NorthWest Arkansas Community College offers students who may not be interested in earning a college degree opportunities to gain college-level training through certificate programs.

Certificate programs are a way to gain practical experience in a chosen field without having to dedicate the years it takes to earn a degree. Most programs may be completed in two semesters. This allows students who don't have time or who struggle with the financial obligation of a degree to receive a quality education.

According to Johnathan Paape, communication and arts divisional advisor, there are 63 diverse certificates offered.

NWACC offers two types of certificates. The first option is a technical certificate and the second is a certificate of proficiency. According to Paape, the main difference between the two programs is the number of required classes. Paape

compares differences to a bachelor's and associate's degree with the associate's degree requiring fewer classes to complete than

the bachelor's degree.

Jennifer Swartout, Ph.D, Dean of the Communication and Arts division, said "certificates can be a great way to launch a career, particularly in industries where the most up-to-date credentials and skills are needed in order to get your foot in the door."

Additionally, Swartout said another benefit of earning a certificate is it can be layered onto a degree. She said a "student can complete an important credential, an associate's degree and at the same time develop specialized knowledge and skills relevant to their career goals. It's a way to stand out among many applicants." Swartout said certificates may be earned with an Associate of Applied Science, Associate of Science, Associate of Arts, and Associate of Fine Arts degrees.

The Technical Certificate in media requires an internship in either graphic design or journalism, but according to Paape, not many certificates require an internship. If a student wants to work more hours while gaining a quick education, then the certificate program is a good choice.

NWACC offers certificate/internship advisors who are available to help students choose a place to intern. These advisors help ensure students are learning and achieving the experiences that can open doors for their future careers.

Internships allow students to work with a trained individual who

Fest Hosts Google Effect

Speaker Addresses Algorithm Dangers

A presentation on "The Google Effect," will be presented as part of NorthWest Arkansas Community College's Spring Arts and Culture Festival 2021: Reimagining the World. The live presentation will be offered virtually via Zoom at 9 a.m., Tuesday, March 2.

"The Google Effect," is presented by Shawna Thorup, the head of Reference and Instruction at NWACC, Allie Stevens, a director at the Calhoun County Library; and Janice Weddle, the Assistant Librarian for Instruction and Outreach at Hendrix College.

This presentation addresses the dangers of algorithms in people's daily lives and the misinformation caused by search engines and social media. Thorup said the presentation was set for SACF 2020, but the presentation was canceled because of the coronavirus pandemic. Thorup said the topic is "just as relevant today, if not more."

Algorithms are a set of rules that help websites, like Facebook, show posts and advertisements they believe the viewer to be interested in. These algorithms "touch every part of our lives," said Weddle, and yet its effect is hard to see even though it is "shaping our reality." Stevens said that "my reality is

vastly different" compared to everyone else because these algorithms cater specifically to each individual.

Thorup said it is challenging to avoid algorithms entirely because of their active role in search engines and social media. It is important to

be deliberate and intentional about being surrounded by people who share different opinions.

"There is no room for compromise in the world when you are surrounded by voices that are telling you, 'you are absolutely right," Thorup said, especially when these people are, for example, elected officials or supervi-

Remaining mindful and collectively holding these companies accountable to work towards what society should look like with a healthy relationship with algorithms is a strong way to combat this
